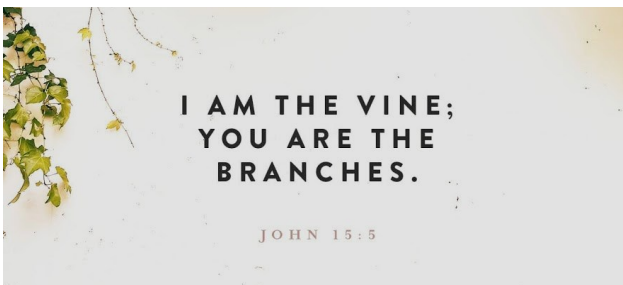

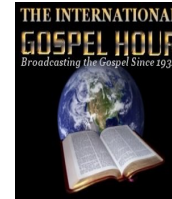

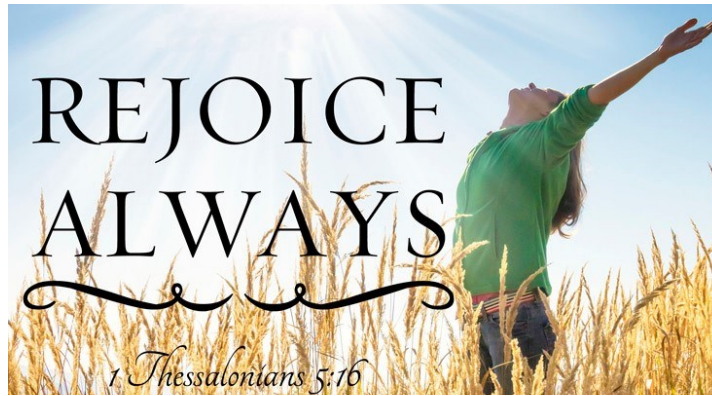

From the Preacher's Pen

OUR CONSTANTLY CHANGING WORLD

Take a quick look at your world and it immediately becomes obvious that all that is around us is in a constant state of change. While the nature of man has not changed, the world in which we live is so different from the world of our grandparents. Imagine what former generations would think if they were transported into our world. It is so different from what they knew.

There is an interesting Greek word used to describe this change. In a historical setting, it was used to describe Jesus as He passed by Matthew, the tax collector, and called him to become a follower of Jesus. Matthew was sitting at his place, but immediately he left all to follow Jesus (Matt. 9:9). Jesus passed by and the situation was never the same.

It is used to describe Jesus' encounter with Bartimaeus, the blind man. As the Lord was passing out of Jericho, He opened his eyes (Matt. 9:27). Jesus continued His journey and the blind man was no longer sitting and begging. He followed Jesus. The world of all those who lived in Jericho was never the same because Jesus walked through their world.

One lexicographer illustrated the meaning of this word as seeing what happened in a panoramic picture as a movie camera scans what is before. As the action occurs, the picture continually changes. This continuous change is emphasized when we note that this Greek word is in the present tense, indicating ongoing change.

With this in mind, consider the spiritual application made of this word. In 2 Corinthians 3, Paul described the face of Moses as it glowed after he had been in the presence of God. The veil Moses wore kept them from immediately seeing the change, but soon it was gone. Paul says that they could not see "what was passing away" (2 Cor. 3:13). That glory shown in his face was passing away. As Paul wrote these words, the glory associated with that law was about to end. Just 15 years after the apostle wrote these words, Judaism came to a crashing halt when the Romans destroyed the temple.

The same is true of our world. John described all that was in the world—the lust of the flesh and eyes and the pride of life—and says it all "is passing away" (1 John 2:15-17). This truth shows us the folly of investing our lives in the physical world. It is passing away.

Our world is constantly changing. Yesterday's world with all its problems does not exist. Can you think of anything which has not changed? I know of only one thing which never changes. "The word of the Lord endures forever" (1 Pet. 1:25). "Every one of Your righteous judgments endures forever" (Psa. 119:160). The world is changing, but He never does!

If you want to know how richly blessed you are,
think about the things you have that no amount of money could replace.

LOOK WHAT JESUS DID WHEN HE WAS HURTING

"C'mon, life! Gimme a break, would you!" Are you tired? Are you discouraged? Are you ready to give up? Does it seem like everything is against you? Are people and circumstances pushing you into deep loneliness or deep frustration or both? What should you do? Answer: Do what Jesus did!

Take a few minutes and think through the life of Jesus. What did Jesus do when He grew tired, discouraged, disappointed, lonely and frustrated? What did Jesus do when people and circumstances were out to get Him? There is much for us to learn.

When Jesus was awakened to the faithlessness of His friends, He went and helped two men who were having a really bad day (Matt. 8:23-32). When Jesus was told to go away and that He was not wanted (although He had just done a good deed), He went and cheered up another man (Matt. 9:1-7). When Jesus was interrupted and taken advantage of, He turned and was kind to the person who disrupted what He was doing (Matt. 9:18-22).

When critics continued to accuse Jesus for doing things they didn't like, He found a man who was hurting and made a positive difference in his life (Matt. 12:9-13). When His enemies were plotting against Him and trying to do away with Him, Jesus withdrew from them and helped some others (Matt. 12:14-15). When some of those closest to Him were offended at Him, He still sought to do nice things for them (Matt. 13:53-58), and when they wanted nothing to do with Him, Jesus went and did good to another man (Luke 4:16-37).

When Jesus felt like He needed to pull back to Himself, especially after repeated frustrations and personal loss, He actually was moved with compassion for others who were hurting and He did what He could to help them, even serving them a meal (Matt. 14:1-21). When those closest to Him continued to struggle with various things, He went out of His way to encourage them and lend them a hand (Matt. 14:22-33).

Even in His darkest moment—when most people would surely have turned inward by now and would be focused on self and would be ready to give up due to discouragement and frustration—Jesus was concerned about others (Luke 23:34, 43) and Jesus was taking care of others (John 19:25-27).

What do we learn from Jesus? What does Jesus teach us to do when life seems unfair and falling in on us, when we get tired and discouraged and disappointed and lonely? The lesson that rings loud and clear throughout the life of Jesus is to get up, go out and... Serve others. Do good unto others. Help others. When it would be easy to focus on self, instead focus on other people. That's what Jesus did.

It is a sad commentary on our culture that the word "honesty"
is usually preceded by the words "old-fashioned."
